New Rules for Use of Fertilizers During Hurricane Season

Bay Harbor Islands Council has introduced new rules for the use of certain fertilizers during the rainy season. Following the Florida-Friendly Fertilizer Use (Code 24-16.1), will protect waterways and the environment from the harmful effects of fertilizer containing nitrogen and phosphorus. Here are some details about the Code:

KNOW THE CODE!

Sec. 24-16.5. - Timing of fertilizer application.

- No fertilizers containing nitrogen and/or phosphorus to turf and/or landscape plants during a Prohibited Application Period.
- Fertilizer can only be applied to actively growing turf and plants.
- Fertilizer containing nitrogen and/or phosphorus can not be applied before seeding or sodding a site and shall not be applied for the first 30 days after seeding or sodding except when hydroseeding for temporary or permanent erosion control in an emergency situation or in accordance with the stormwater pollution prevention plan for that site.

Sec. 24-16.6. - Fertilizer-free zones.

- Except as provided in subsection (b) below, fertilizer shall not be applied within 20 feet from the top of a seawall or bank of any surface water of Biscayne Bay or any waterway or storm drain, as defined by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (Fertilizer-Free Zone).
- Spreader deflector shields are required when fertilizing adjacent to fertilizer-free zones or impervious surfaces.
- Newly planted turf and landscape plants may be fertilized within a Fertilizer-Free Zone only for a sixty (60) day period beginning 30 days after planting, if needed, to allow the plants to become well established and caution is used to prevent direct deposition of nutrients into the water.

Sec. 24-16.7. - Low maintenance zones.



A voluntary ten-foot low maintenance zone is strongly recommended, but not mandated, from the top of a seawall or bank of any surface water of Biscayne Bay or any waterway or storm drain. A swale/berm system is recommended for

installation at the landward edge of this low maintenance zone to capture and filter runoff. If more stringent Miami Dade County Code regulations apply, this provision does not relieve the requirement to adhere to the more stringent regulations. No mowed or cut vegetative material should be deposited or left remaining in the low maintenance zone or deposited in the water. Care should be taken to prevent the over-spray of aquatic weed products in the low maintenance zone. Care must be taken to ensure erosion of the surface soil does not occur. Excessive erosion may result in additional pollution hazard.

Sec. 24-16.8. - Fertilizer content and application rates.

Fertilizers containing nitrogen and/or phosphorous applied to turf and/or landscape plants within the Town shall contain no less than sixty-five (65) percent slow release, controlled release, timed release, slowly available, or water insoluble nitrogen per guaranteed analysis label. Caution should be used to prevent direct deposition of nutrients in the water.

PLANNING & ZONING BOARD

The Planning & Zoning Board is responsible for the review of new construction, exterior renovations, additions, plan revisions, etc. The Board meets on the first and third Tuesday of the month. Professionals need not be residents of Bay Harbor Islands, but must be presently employed full time or were employed full time in the field of engineering, architecture, land use and zoning law, city planning, construction, or any other field which substantially relates to the planning and development of real estate.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Committee meets quarterly or as members deemed necessary. The committee members provide recommendations and feedback to the Town Council regarding current/future park facilities and recreational programs.

SUSTAINABILITY AND RESILIENCY COMMITTEE

This committee addresses topics related to sustainability, resiliency and environmental impacts to the Town.

BE HURRICANE READY IN 2021

HOW TO PREPARE

- **GET THE OFFICIAL HURRICANE READINESS GUIDE** at Town Hall or go to miamidade.gov/hurricane for complete details in English, Español and Kreyòl.
- **SAFELY TRIM BACK ALL TREES** on your property that have grown close to Florida Power and Light (FPL) electric lines and other utility lines.
- **BEFORE A STORM IS ON THE HORIZON** put all items out for pick-up. Do not wait until it is too late. Keep the front of your yard free of all mulch. During heavy rain, mulch washes into roadways and ends up in the Town's storm drain system.
- **REVIEW YOUR HURRICANE PLAN NOW.** Prepare your home and plan your evacuation route and destination. Create a hurricane list for you and your family.
- **SIGN UP FOR CODE RED AND FOLLOW LOCAL NEWS** to stay connected and aware of the latest information regarding any storm event that may impact Bay Harbor Islands. Visit the Town's official website and social media.
- **AT-RISK SENIORS AND RESIDENTS** needing medical care or transportation assistance during a mandatory evacuation should register with the Miami-Dade County Emergency & Evacuation Assistance Program (EEAP) in advance of any storm. If you or someone you know requires assistance or transportation, call 311.
- **DO NOT WAIT UNTIL A STORM IS THREATENING** to complete your hurricane kit. Make sure your evacuation plans are completed. Gather non-perishable food and emergency supplies for your household before any storms are imminent.

WHEN A STORM IS IMMINENT

- **PROTECT YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY** by securing windows and doors with Miami-Dade County-approved storm shutters. Bring in patio furniture, garbage cans, bins and other items not secured that could become airborne. Unplug all appliances and if power is lost, only use flashlights, not candles.
- **BAY HARBOR ISLANDS IS ZONE B** in the Miami-Dade Storm Surge Planning Zones. Oceanic storm surge and interior flooding is possible. If flooding threatens your home, turn off electricity at the main breaker. Stay in a sheltered room in your home and away from windows. Do not leave your home until the storm is completely passed.

- **A MANDATORY EVACUATION MAY BE ORDERED**
This means Bay Harbor Islands residents should leave coastal areas. Evacuation centers will open, but they should only be considered as a last resort. You are encouraged to stay with family or friends in a non-evacuation area. Make your plans now. If evacuations are ordered and you decide to go to a county shelter, visit www.miamidade.gov/hurricane or call 311 to find the closest available shelter. Bring your proof of residents, bedding, food, snacks, medications and personal items.

WHAT TO DO AFTER THE STORM

- **MANY INJURIES OCCUR AFTER A STORM**, so stay inside until authorities say it is safe to go outside. Call the Bay Harbor Islands Police Department or utility companies immediately to report hazards such as downed power lines, broken gas or water mains or overturned gas tanks. Monitor notifications or other communications for information on safety issues, waste collection and hurricane debris pickups. Obey curfew and emergency orders when issued.
- **IF YOU HAVE EVACUATED, PLEASE BE PATIENT.** You may have to wait several days to return. Have your picture ID ready to show to authorities when returning. Residents will not be allowed back into Town until an all clear is issued. Bay Harbor Islands Police Department will have a secure perimeter around the Town and assess damage from flooding, downed electric lines and debris blocking roadways. Residents and business owners will be notified when to return via CodeRed notifications, official Town social media and the Town website at www.bayharborislands-fl.gov.



Residents can report a power outage or check the status of a reported outage by calling FPL at 1-800- 468-8243. Bay Harbor Islands is a customer of FPL just like you and has no influence on when power will be restored.

Keep Pollution Away From Storm Drains and Out of Our Vulnerable Bay Waters

Believe it or not - the greatest source of water pollution today is households. One of the big reasons – people treat storm drains like sewers. The problem is, sewage is treated but stormwater is not. What you put on your lawn, your patio or the street gets washed into our storm drains and flows directly into our waterways, untreated.



stormwater runoff collects pollutants such as fertilizers, pesticides, animal feces and oil and delivers it right into our waterways.

WHAT'S THE ISSUE WITH FERTILIZER?

Fertilizer isn't a problem if it is used carefully – but if you use too much or apply it at the wrong

In natural, undeveloped areas, a large percentage of rain water is absorbed into the ground. Natural processes cleanse the water as it moves through vegetation and soil and into our ground water. Development replaces these natural areas with impervious surfaces like roads, parking lots, roofs, and driveways. That means less groundwater infiltration and more stormwater runoff. Uncontrolled

time, it can wash off your lawn into storm drains and then flow untreated into our Bay. Fertilizers contain "nutrients" such as nitrates and phosphates that over-stimulate the growth of aquatic plants and algae, clogging our waterways, causing deep water organisms to die and decompose. The result can be fish-kills like we saw in Biscayne Bay this past year.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

How can you fertilize and help keep our waters clean?

- Use fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides sparingly. Whatever you put on your lawn could find its way into our waterways.
- Choose fertilizer with a low phosphorus number (middle number). Only newly-seeded lawns or phosphorus-deficient soils require phosphorus.
- Don't fertilize if heavy rain is likely or during the prohibition period* of June 1st through November 1st or during a time period when a storm or heavy rain is expected.
- Consider using organic fertilizers; they release nutrients more slowly.
- Sweep fertilizers and other chemicals that get on the driveway/sidewalk back onto your lawn to keep them out of our storm drains.
- Use commercially available compost or make your own using garden waste. Mixing compost with your soil means your plants will need less chemical fertilizer and it puts your waste to good use.

KNOW THE CODE

Don't Strain Our Drains!

The dumping of piles of yard waste curbside by landscaping companies is a violation of Town Code. Leaf litter and small branches may be blown or washed into our storm drains by high winds and rain causing blockages and flooding. Make sure your landscaping company knows the code.

Bay Harbor Islands, Florida - Code of Ordinances, Chapter 9 - SOLID WASTE COLLECTION, ARTICLE II. - COLLECTION

(For the complete text, go to tinyurl.com/BHI-SW-C9)

Sec. 9-21. - Definitions.

Special handling garden trash. Accumulation of palm fronds, bushes, shrubbery, tree branches, tree limbs, parts of trees, that are over three inches in diameter and not exceeding four feet in length, all of which is too large to be containerized.

Sec. 9-22. - Collection generally; deposit of garbage and landscape debris in containers; placement and location; bagging; bulk waste; hazardous waste; construction debris. *Landscape debris that is created by the efforts of owners or occupants of property serviced by the town will be collected by the town or its agent. Landscape firms or others paid for their work shall remove and transport to disposal facilities outside the town the landscape debris and special-handling landscape debris created by their efforts.*

Sec. 9-24. - Pickup procedures.

Landscape debris shall be placed in the town-provided containers, which shall remain at the side or in the rear of the property for back-yard collection. No waste or debris other than bulk yard waste shall be placed at curbside. Bulk yard waste may be placed at curbside in accordance with the provisions of sections 9-22 (See preceding paragraphs).

Special-handling garden trash or bulk yard waste (see definition) shall be placed neatly at curbside for collection on the day designated for bulk yard waste. Such debris shall not be placed out for collection any sooner than the day prior to the collection day.

Special-handling trash and bulk waste will be collected by the town or its authorized agent only on the day designated for bulk waste collection provided such waste is in compliance with other requirements of this ordinance. (See definitions.)

Sec. 9-26. - Littering; throwing material in drains and sewers.

It shall be unlawful to throw any paper, trash, garbage or debris upon any street, alley, park, waterway, bay or other public or private property in the town; or to cast or throw or cause to be cast or thrown into any of the gutters, drains or sewers within the Town of Bay Harbor Islands any garbage, trash, tree or grass cuttings, or other substance calculated to cause any obstruction or nuisance to the gutters, drains, or sewers.



Driver License Services at Community Center



Starting in June, Florida Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles will provide driver license services to BHI residents on the second Friday of the month 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. at the Morris N. Broad Community Center (1175 95th Street). Appointments are required. For an appointment on Friday, June 11, go to tinyurl.com/bhi-cc-register.

The Mini-FLOW is a convenient method to renew a driver

license, obtain a replacement driver license, change a name or address on a driver license, get an identification card, renew a vehicle registration, obtain a disabled parking placard or purchase a specialty license plate.

Florida has new documentation requirements for residents renewing or obtaining a driver license or photo ID card. Visit flhsmv.gov for a complete listing of documents needed and other information related to obtaining a driver license or photo ID card. Fees vary based on service. Mosquito Season has Arrived



June begins the Miami-Dade Mosquito Control's every two-week seasonal larvicide treatments in Bay Harbor Islands. The truck-spraying will take place between the hours of 2-5 a.m. on the following Thursdays: June 3, June 17, July 1, July 15 and

July 29. The treatment is strictly proactive and not in response to any immediate health threat. The larvicide used is an organic product not harmful to humans, pets, bees or aquatic areas. For your part, you should:

- Drain standing irrigation or rainwater and discard old items lying about that may store water.

- Use repellent on bare skin; DEET at 20 to 30 percent concentration works well for most people when used according to label directions – but don't apply on infants.
- Empty and clean birdbaths and outdoor pet water bowls once or twice weekly.
- Irrigate lawns and gardens to prevent water from standing for several days. Mow the lawn regularly.
- Report any infestations to Miami-Dade Mosquito Control by calling 311.
- Remember to Drain & Cover!
